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Health Experts Warn COVID-19 Cases May Rise Due to New BA.2 Variant

COVID-19 cases have trended down in the United States since a <u>peak of infections in January 2022</u>, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Now, health experts warn of a potential uptick of infections in the coming months due to the emergence of BA.2—a new variant of Omicron, which was the leading variant causing COVID-19 cases during the coronavirus pandemic's spike in infections this winter.

According to <u>data from the CDC</u>, BA.2 makes up over half of the current COVID-19 cases in the United States. This number has consistently grown, and experts warn that this trend is likely to continue. Globally, BA.2 is the most common variant circulating, according to the World Health Organization (WHO).

Health experts suggest there is no evidence that the BA.2 variant causes more severe illness than the coronavirus Omicron variant. However, the new variant is thought to be more transmissible, creating concerns about its ability to spread more quickly.

At this time, experts recommend primary vaccination and booster shots as a critical measure to protect against BA.2. Health officials continue to learn more about the variant, such as how well antibodies from previous COVID-19 infections protect against reinfection.
